A Tradition that continues today!



Victorian Navy Relics applications for iPhone and Android Smartphones.

The Victorian Navy Relics App shows the location & details of known relics of Victoria's Colonial Navy.

Relics from the world's oldest surviving monitor warship, the largest Man-o-War built during the Napoleonic Wars, Victoria's gunboats, torpedo boats & auxiliary vessels are covered in this App.

In all, 25 vessels served between 1856 & 1901 to defend Victoria in the event of war with Russia, France or the USA. Items covered in the App, dating from 1786 to 1892, include bells, anchors, monuments, a figure-head, 90 cannon & hundreds of smaller relics as well as 25 vessels.

Hundreds of images illustrate the various relics and help explain how they were used as well as describing their life since the end of their service.

At under 30 megabits the application is small enough to leave on a Smartphone until needed, which at the touch of the defined icon the closest 12 relics are identified with a map showing how to find them.

Ed Note doesn't include living legends of the RANCBA branch who believe they fullfill the definition of relic:-)

Once downloaded an internet connection is not required unless more than the basic map is needed. Details, images, the GPS location and how to find the surviving relics and vessels can all be accessed offline.



Our Australian Navy! (Riverina Herald Echuca/Moama Oct 1913)

The arrival of the flagship of the Australian Fleet in Sydney last week was an event of more than ordinary importance, symbolising as it does the practical completion of the Australian unit of the Imperial Navy.

It is only a few years back that the question of Australia relying upon its own resources or continuing to be dependent, as in the past, upon the British Navy for protection against aggression was hotly debated.

Many indeed considered that it was a yet too early for a young country like Australia with its limited population, to undertake the financial responsibility of maintaining a fleet in these waters which would be controlled by the Commonwealth Government, as the burden might be heavy – there was much more to be gained from having our own Fleet subject Australian control in Australian waters.

Another view of the proposal that Australia should build and maintain its own fleet was that as a dependency of Great Britain a separate unit locally under the control of the Commonwealth would op up certain dangers in Britain's foreign policy, whilst there were others who professed to see in Australia's awakened Naval and Military enthusiasm some ulterior object which would threaten the unity of the Empire.

It was in vain to point out to such detractors that Australia had in view its own National safety and that building such a Fleet it would ensure to

some extent not only that safety! but create a Naval Force of some value to the Empire: at the same time taking upon its own shoulders the cost of maintaining it.


Which provides an online book on the 2013 International Fleet Review in Sydney! Australia's attitude was made very clear at the last Imperial Defence Conference, and though it took some pressure upon the part of Australian representatives to assure the Imperial authorities that the Commonwealth was determined to pursue a policy of responsible self-defence it was eventually recognised that the course being in accord with the aspirations of the Australian people one that would not be in conflict with Imperial interests.

Mr M'Kenna the Home Secretary, accurately summing up the position when he remarked that

"while there is to be no interference with the autonomy of any member of the Empire the foundations have been laid of a naval strength which, if combined in war will safeguard Imperial interests in every part of the globe"

This embodies the views of all the representatives that whilst the Commonwealth has complete control of its own fleet in times of peace – the Australian Fleet being in war time practically a unit of the British Navy will be under the control of the British Admiralty.

That is a wise decision from a strategic point of view and very necessary so long as Australian remains portion of the British Empire.



BLUE MOON
